- Assistive Technology Resource Centers of Hawai'i (ATRC) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, federally-funded organization that provides:
 - Access to assistive technology (AT) for people with disabilities of all ages.
 - Information, education, and training to individuals throughout the Hawaiian Islands through comprehensive programs.



- Linking individuals with technology so all people can participate in every aspect of life.
- Empowering individuals to maintain dignity and control in their lives by promoting technology through advocacy, training, information, and education.

What is Assistive Technology?

Assistive technology (AT) is any item or equipment that helps people work around challenges so they can learn, communicate, and function better.

It may be homemade, specially-designed, modified, or made commercially available.





- Assistive technology (AT) is anything that helps a student/person do a task
- Three types of assistive technology (AT)
 - 1. Low-Tech—easy to do it yourself
 - 2. Mid-Tech—may be provided by school or available to borrow from ATRC
 - O 3. High-Tech—find out how to access/get built-in tools with the tech you have



LOW Tech Devices

Easy to find or make!

- Most common form of assistive technology
- Present in many homes
 - Easy to turn into accommodations
- Simple adaptive tools

Examples


- Jumbo anything
- Adapted pencil, pens, and erasers
- Slant board
- Highlighters
- Tactile ruler












LOW Tech Devices


Examples (cont.)

- Clips/clothespins (for grip for turning pages)
- Adaptive Paper (special spacing, lines, colors, etc.)
- Manipulatives (for counting, measuring, making patterns, and sorting)
- Visual schedules
- Velcro











MID Tech Devices

From school or ATRC

- Least common form of AT
- Usually powered/battery operated
- Relatively simple to operate

MID Tech Devices

Examples

- Screen magnifier
- FM system
- Voice amplifier
- Adapted keyboard
- Mouse alternatives
- Switches
 - To operate adapted toys, games, appliances, and technology
- Digital recorders
- Static-display communication devices





Using the tech you have


- Most intense and expensive form of technology

Scheduling/Time Management

 Google Calendar: keep track of when class starts and due dates—practically anything time sensitive—and set reminders to alert you

Writing

Text-to-speech: hear text read aloud

Auditory Processing, Reading Comprehension, Dyslexia

- Speak Selection: listen to the words on screen, with customizable rate of speech, word tracking
- Type with your voice: translate speech to text
- Invert colors: improves screen clarity with higher contrast
- Zoom magnify anything on the screen

Inter-island airfare scholarships were available to Neighbor Island participants.


